

WORKHORSE VOLUNTARY BRAKE RECALL

BE AWARE OF THE WARNING SIGNS.

Keep this card accessible in your motor home cab, along with your copy of the interim letter. They contain important information about the voluntary Workhorse brake recall.

Can you continue to use your motor home? Yes. Enjoy the RV lifestyle and use your motor home.

We do ask that you drive safely and be aware of the following warning indicators that could indicate a potential brake issue: (If you experience any of these indicators, please follow instructions on the reverse side of this card.)

- a. **You notice a distinct “brake burning” smell.**
- b. **One or more of your brakes feels like it is “dragging”, and you need to apply more throttle to overcome the drag.**
- c. **Your ABS brake light illuminates, possibly indicating that the ABS sensor has overheated, causing damage and corrupting the signal at that wheel end.**
- d. **Smoke comes from the wheel end. This would be noticed during any stop when you exit the vehicle.**
- e. **Your brake pedal feels soft/spongy or goes to the floor — this indicates that the brake fluid is possibly boiling and that your brake system is losing its effectiveness.**

Note: Motor homes that are kept in storage for long periods of time are at a higher risk of brake performance degradation.

WHAT TO DO.

While driving.

If you are on the road and experience any of the indicators listed on the other side, do the following:

- Pull your motor home over in a safe location off the road and stop.
- Examine your wheel ends for excessive heat or for smoke.
